Racine Video Production Workshop Project: More Voices Podcast Network

The More Voices Podcast Network project seeks to give voice to underrepresented populations in the Racine community by asking people to share their lived experiences on a video podcast. Students in the program are given career-building experience creating video podcasts and were engaged in determining episode topics, developing logos and producing and promoting the podcasts. Racine Video Production highlighted the importance of promoting diverse content creators and amplifying the voices of historically marginalized populations.

Driven by what they learned through the project, three participants purchased their own equipment and are working for local news website Racine County Eye covering high school sports. Other participants are also starting their careers in photography and filmmaking as a result of their time with the More Voices Podcast Network.

By the Numbers

- 82 video episodes and 186 short clips were produced
- 849,192 views across all platforms (YouTube, TikTok, Facebook, Instagram), far surpassing the program goal of 600,000 views
- 109 crew members
- Total unduplicated number of participants: 569 including crew, members, mentors and guests
- 269 guests at in-person events



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"We don't have a video communication or visual media pathway at Case. Many people, including me, would like to go into this as a career, and we don't have that. The program and podcast introduce people to those careers." – Reina Spicka, Case High School freshman







Burlington Senior Activity Center created the Tell Your Story project to collect oral histories of local seniors. The program helped seniors record their life stories, with an aim of increasing participants' self-esteem, selfactualization and recognition of achievements. The most significant success was the increase in and benefit of socialization for the participants. Burlington Senior Activity Center has found that socialization can combat both depression and dementia.

Tell Your Story also incorporated a live storytelling event, called a story slam. The multigenerational event was a success, with nearly all participants and attendees reporting having learned something new about another generation and that they felt storytelling was an important life skill.

Tell Your Story helps remind the community that senior citizens are viable contributors to our society. Burlington Senior Activity Center plans to continue the program using the equipment purchased with Equity Innovation Fund grant money.



By the Numbers

- 52 seniors interviewed
- 2 story slams facilitated
- 100% of participants reported a positive effect on their self-concept
- Half of participants said their self-image improved





NAMI Racine County Project: Compassionate Conversations: a NAMI Racine County Podcast for Mental Illness and Mental Health

NAMI set out to bring awareness to mental health and mental health stigma with the Compassionate Conversations project. Compassionate Conversations used a podcast to host discussions centered around mental health, helping normalize speaking out about mental health issues and bring awareness to mental health services available. Several community partners shared expertise including representatives from government, health care, nonprofit organizations and more.

Through this innovative platform, NAMI was able to reach beyond its typical circle of impact to provide information and education on mental health and illness, helping reduce barriers marginalized individuals often face surrounding mental health. Those served by this podcast had free access and anonymous listening to help learn about programs available in the community.

Compassionate Conversations will be moving into a second season with funding secured using the data showing the successes of the first season of podcasts.

By the Numbers

- 298 listeners
- 90% of podcast guests strongly agreed that Compassionate Conversations will increase awareness of mental health and mental illness
- 100% of podcast guests strongly agreed that Compassionate Conversations will help break down stigma in our community
- 11 podcasts completed

From its launch in January 2022 to the completion of the grants included in this report, United Way of Racine County's Equity Innovation Fund has awarded 15 grants to organizations, totaling more than \$595,000. More than 2,470 people have been served by the projects supported through these 15 Equity Innovation Fund grants.
