


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COMMUNITY SCHOOLS

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The Four Pillars of Community Schools are:

- **Integrated Support.** Our integrated student support model is not about completing schoolwork for students, but about ensuring that all kids have access to the community resources and tools they require in order to maximize their potential and succeed. It's about placing students at the heart of our efforts and surrounding them with a caring community of support led by our dedicated staff.
- **Expanded and enriched learning time and opportunities.** This pillar is critical to schools' ability to support students' academic growth as well as their social, emotional and physical development. Community schools, in addition to supporting rich, student-centered instruction in classrooms, provide students with up to one-third more learning time in which they can engage in arts, physical activity, small group or individualized academic support and hands-on learning activities across a variety of subject areas.
- **Family and community engagement.** Community schools implement a family engagement strategy that solicits and incorporates family expertise and knowledge into all aspects of the community school, including asset and needs assessment, collaborative planning, and the implementation and continuous improvement of community school programs and services.
- **Collaborative Leadership and Practices.** Collaboration among school personnel, community partners, and families connects and reinforces the preceding three pillars. Community schools can help children, families and communities by building a shared vision, value system and leadership team.

Being a community school means all stakeholders hold a level of responsibility when it comes to student success. Stakeholders include school staff, support services, families, community members and others. Community schools operate under the idea that in order for our students to thrive in school, their basic needs should be met. This is where donations play a huge role. School Counselors in Community Schools

All schools have at least one school counselor, but what do they do? In Racine Unified School District, school counselors promote student success, provide preventative services and respond to student needs that have been identified. They do all of these things by addressing academics, careers, personal life and social development for all students with intentional counseling interventions.

Knapp and Julian Thomas each have one school counselor and Mitchell has four school counselors. When asked about their role at a community school, this is what a few school counselors had to say:




Julian Thomas

Mental Health Moment: Healthy Boundaries

Having and maintaining healthy boundaries is important for self-care and having positive relationships with others. Boundaries look different from person to person. Setting boundaries starts with self-reflection and understanding your expectations of yourself and of others, then telling others what your expectations are and being able to respectfully let others know if they are not meeting your expectations for how they treat you.

When setting boundaries keep these tips in mind:

1. Be clear and direct while staying calm- "I have a personal bubble. It makes me uncomfortable being this close to others."
2. State your need request using direct language- "I need you to back up a bit." or "Can you please take two steps back?"
3. It's okay if it's uncomfortable

Program Spotlight: Racine County Foster Care

From Foster Parent Recruitment & Retention Specialist Jessica Scheeler:

I am so excited to announce our second annual sticker contest! Last year we asked you to open your heart and get involved with promoting Racine County Foster Care in 2022. This year, we are asking you to step up and step into a child's life in 2023!

Last year, we launched our new marketing campaign: "Keep Them Home Racine County: Fostering our Community, Fostering our Kids." This campaign was a follow up to the work that started in 2018, when we did a fantastic job of bringing our kids home to Racine County. Our out-of-county placements dropped from over 100 to 18 kids today. You responded and helped through 144 inquiries to "Keep Them Home." In 2022, we licensed 20 new homes and were able to keep 94 percent of our children placed in out-of-home care within 40 miles of their biological home. On average, children in care in Racine County are within 2.9 miles of their biological home. We are now asking you to step up and step into a child's life in 2023! It just takes one caring adult to influence the outcome of a child. Will you step up?

We are inviting you to get involved with a community-wide, super-fun sticker contest! Here are the details:

- Community members, adults and kids alike are encouraged to design a 2"x2" sticker that includes the words "Step Up and Step into a Child's Life" and "Racine County" and features artwork about why they believe foster care is important to our community.

- Please make sure to include your name, age and title (community member, teacher, organization member, etc.)
- Racine County Foster Care staff members will select the top 10 entries. These finalists will be featured on the Racine County Foster Care Facebook page, and the community will vote for their favorite entries. Voting will occur April 10-17!

The winner of the contest will be announced May 1, 2023.

The winner will:

- Have their sticker prominently featured as part of May's Foster Care Month events and materials and handed out all year long at other Foster Care events.
- Have their sticker featured on the Racine County Foster Care Facebook page and website.
- Be given a specially printed t-shirt with their winning sticker design.
